

Listening with Dr. Athearn

Dr. Athearn's Listening course helps students become motivated to focus on understanding the people around them. As Dr. Athearn teaches, "that is one of the most important things that we can offer to another human being, is to give them the feeling that they are understood by someone." This course allows students to understand the importance of their role as a listener in the communication process through an interactive environment including having in-depth discussions about the different listening skill sets. There are so many misconceptions about listening, so in this course, Dr. Athearn states that she "shakes up students' worldview and lays down a fresh foundation." "Having students unlearn what they thought listening was so that they can understand, from a groundwork up, how to think about listening, conceptualize it, and how they can then create new building blocks to develop those

Dr. Athearn's Listening course teaches skills that are applicable for students in any major. The skills learned can help students reach their professional and personal goals to be an exceptional listener. Moreover, this course teaches that listening is the very first communication skill we learn. We start discriminative listening before we even leave the womb. Not only is it the first communication skill we learn, it is the skill we use most often as we listen more than we speak, read, and write.

By the end of this course, Dr. Athearn wants students to see themselves as empowered listeners. Someone who is an empowered listener is someone who understands the different skill sets that can be applied to different listening situations. It is the ability to recognize what kind of listening tools you need to apply to a situation and be able to adjust your listening skill set to meet the needs of that situation.

Speech and Debate

The UF Speech and Debate Team is comprised of three squads:
Public Debate, Competitive Debate, and Speech. Through
competitions and workshops members are able to enhance their
research, presentation, and argumentation skills.

Public Debate

The Public Debate Team performs on campus with debates about current issues, philosophical inquiries, historical contentions, and beyond. We are always open to new members and easy to join.

Novice or not, this team will help enhance your skills in public speaking as well as argumentation.

Competitive Debate

The Competitive Debate squad is a team that travels nationally to compete in multiple forms of intercollegiate debate including IPDA and Policy. Through research and competition, the members learn about politics, critical theory, international relations, and argumentation.

Speech Team

The speech team is one of the competitive, traveling squads.

Members on the speech team can select from diverse styles of speech and oral interpretation.

They prepare on topics of their choosing; these speeches are used by the members to hone their skills and to compete nationally.

Intercultural Communication with Erika Clesi

Studying abroad at Royal Holloway-University of London (RHUL) for the fall semester was such an exciting experience! RHUL is in Egham, England, and is a short train ride to London. The host family I stayed with lives in a town called Staines-upon-Thames, or simply "Staines." I think Staines and Egham closely resembled Branford, my hometown in Florida, which made me feel more at home. However, going to London the first time was a completely different experience! I was totally thrown out of my element trying to navigate the city's buses, trains, and the London Underground.

My best piece of advice to students looking to travel (especially for the first time) is to be open and have patience. It wasn't easy learning how to navigate England (especially train stations like Clapham Junction), but over time, got more and more used to it and became bette at navigating its large traffic system.




However, a lot of this knowledge didn't come to me overnight! Prior to my studies at RHUL, I took Intercultural Communication with Dr. Jung, which is a course offered by the Dial Center. I think this course was key to my travel success.

Intercultural communication has taught me to appreciate the differences in traditions between English and American culture. You may even find after a while that you prefer the traditions your host country has rather than those of your home country! One tradition I loved in the U.K. was my host family's Sunday roast, which is like having a Thanksgiving dinner at the end of every week.

While in London, I visited places like the National Gallery, Twinings (London's oldest tea shop!), the British Library, the London Eye, and Windsor Castle. Feel free to reach out and ask me anything! I plan to go back to the U.K. soon.
